Hospitality Alleluia Style

In recent years, I have presented a program called "Pray the Windows" where I explain the meaning and symbolism of the beautiful stained glass windows at St. Mary on the Hill Catholic Church. I then take several windows and show how I have used them for prayer. One of my prayer windows portrays the "Visitation," and I have named this window "hospitality." I see smiling Elizabeth with arms open wide greeting Mary, her visitor, whose arms are open ready to receive this warm greeting. They are both standing in front of the door to the house. When I meditate on this picture, I ask God to help me be open to greeting whoever He sends me today and that I will receive others' gestures of hospitality toward me with a grateful heart. I believe that extending and receiving love is part of God's

God must consider hospitality very important because examples can be found throughout the Old and New Testament. In my travels to the Middle East, I have experienced wonderful outpourings of hospitality that is so basic to their culture. I came to the realization that I was called to practice Christian hospitality and that, in reality, all Christians are called to show others the love of Christ Jesus which is hospitality.

In Alleluia Community we are getting ready to have visitors just like Elizabeth had Mary as a guest. Our visitation will take place June 27 through the end of July in the form of Christian brothers and sisters from Jundiai, Brazil. They are here to learn about ecumenical, covenant community life and to improve their English by living with us and observing us on a daily basis. We have a wonderful opportunity to show God's love to those He is sending to us. May I exhort each of you—every man, woman and child—to respond with warm Alleluia hospitality.

Here are several suggestions that may help you to feel more comfortable in extending hospitality.

- 1. Make eye contact. This is a cultural thing and in our culture eye contact is very important, so model this small but meaningful gesture.
- 2. A firm handshake is appropriate, but a hug would be welcoming and more like what our guests are used to in Brazil.
- 3. Introductions are so important. Work hard on remembering and correctly pronouncing each person's name. Repeat it, ask about the spelling and then remember to use their names when introducing them to others.

Always introduce yourself even if you have already been introduced. Give your name again. The visitors are meeting many new people and you can help them keep names straight. Keep in mind that some of our names will be different to them. I'll bet they haven't met too many "Dorries," so I will have to keep reminding them.

4. To engage our visitors in con-

versation is a kind act, and there are several guidelines that you can follow to help the encounter go smoothly.

Speak at a slower rate—This is the most important single thing that you can do to help the Brazilians understand you.

When not understood, repeat. It is not necessary to raise your volume. They are not hard of hearing; they

just need time to process what you have said. If they still do not understand, re-phrase. You can also use gestures.

Remember to use simple language. Using slang or colloquial phrases will impede your communication. Example: "That shirt will cost you an arm and a leg." A better way would be to say, "That shirt will cost you much money."

Listen! Ask questions and listen to their response. Questions about family, occupation, church, travel, what do they enjoy/like and where are they living while in Alleluia are good conversation starters.

- 5. If you see a visitor alone at a meeting, go to them and ask if you can help. Maybe you could offer to sit with them or explain something they don't understand.
- 6. Communicating one-on-one will be easier than trying to communi-

cate in a group, but the most important thing is not the setting but to engage them in conversation and reach out to them.

- 7. SMILE—A smile crosses all language barriers and is very welcoming.
- 8. Until one is proficient in a language, jokes are very difficult. Many jokes are based on advanced language skills.
- 9. If a visitor makes a mistake while in a casual conversation, a good thing to do is to model the correct way without correcting the person's speech directly. Example: "Her goed to the store." You can repeat back to them, "Oh, she went to the store." Our ears are our corrector mechanism and they must hear correct language patterns modeled.

Support Groups can invite individual Brazilians to their meetings. Individuals can invite a visitor to join them and their family for an activity such as fireworks on the 4th of July, swimming at a pool, a concert, or a sporting event.

Remember your manners—include don't exclude! All these suggestions apply to everyone. Kids and adults are to be witnesses for Jesus, and He thinks hospitality is important.

May this up-coming "Visitation" be a blessing to you and to our Community. Hospitality is showing the love of Jesus to others. Alleluia hospitality is going the extra mile to show our visitors just how much Jesus loves them.
